





Ausettua Amor Amenkum African Dance Workshop
Explore the dynamic movement of African dance as it manifests itself in New Orleans culture through second-line, Mardi Gras, and the dances of Congo Square.

Michael Rohd Devising Performance: Community, Context & Self Rohd is the founding artistic director of Portland's Sojourn Theatre and of Hope Is Vital, an international theatre and community dialogue resource, and author of the book *Theatre for Community, Conflict, and Dialogue* (Heinemann, 1998). Participants will play from story and body to explore strategies for making work alone and in groups. How does architecture make any space a potentially surprising place for performance? What does history have to do with my expression of who I am? How can a group move from 'truth' to 'fiction' and back again through metaphor, movement, and inquiry?

Lisa D'Amour Stanley (2006)

OBIE-Award winning playwright and multidisciplinary performance artist Lisa D'Amour – best known to New Orleans audiences as the writer and director of ArtSpot's Nita & Zifa – presents brother Todd D'Amour as a man convinced he is Stanley Kowalski set loose from Tennessee Williams' A Streetcar Named Desire. Traversing a landscape both comical and frightening, Stanley (2006) takes the audience on an unpredictable theatrical ride through the raw emotions of loss, regret and desire.

Dah Teatar In Search of the Miraculous World of the Inner Story
The forming of Dah Teatar in 1991 coincided with the fall of ex-Yugoslavia and the general destruction that followed. The group, perhaps subconsciously, chose to oppose the destruction with creation, to create in the midst of a world falling apart a microcosmos of theatre. Maja Mitic and Aleksandra Jelic lead this workshop on finding balance between techniques and inspirations, longings and realities, and how to express oneself in the contemporary theatre of the twenty-first century! Participants should wear t-shirts and pants or skirts of the same color, and bring a song from childhood, a short memorized text (not longer than 5 sentences), and a poem. There will be no observers allowed.

Odin Teatret The Dance of Intentions | Shoot the Arrow around the Corner The morning workshop will concentrate on the actor's physical training and awakening of the actor's presence. The afternoon workshop will address creating a base for the development of the actor's personal physical training, the opposition of thought and action, and improvisation with fixed elements/fixed actions. Odin Teatret guest artist master classes and demonstrations at Tulane University are co-sponsored by the Tulane University Department of Theatre and Dance. Odin morning workshops are open for observers only.

Alternate ROOTS' UPROOTED: The Katrina Project
This residency/presentation is at the forefront of a relief effort that focuses on rebuilding community and energizing community activism. Gulf Coast ROOTS member-artists who have been directly impacted by the devastation of Hurricane Katrina are touring the U.S. conducting week-long residencies and performances in communities with significant evacuee populations. Ker Wells Living Tall
Ker is an actor, director and teacher and a founding member of the acclaimed physical theatre company
Primus Theatre under the direction of Richard Fowler (who at that time was a member of Denmark's Odin
Teatret). In this workshop he presents a preview of his current work-in-progress, followed by a demonstration of the origins of the actions and the physical material.

NACL Exploring Presence
What does it mean for an actor to be present? Participants will engage in a series of simple, playful, and physically demanding exercises that require a special level of attention and reaction — to the self, to the other, and to the space. Brad Krumholz began his training as an actor in 1991, first with a short but impactful study with Odin Teatret's Roberta Carreri, and then under the more extended tutelage of former Odin actor work tradition of Jerzy Grotowski in 1994 when he met Raymond

Bobgan, with whom he trained until 1996 NACL Ensemble Singing
Tannis Kowalchuk, a founding member of Primus Theatre and the artistic director of NACL, will teach group songs from around the world in two and three-part harmony. The songs will be taught without sheet music in a relaxed and celebratory atmosphere with a focus on listening, harmony, pitch and rhythm. Songs will include traditional music from the USA, Eastern Europe, and Africa. No experience necessary.

A woman dressed in white chants incantations under the looming shelter of the giant roots of a fallen pecan tree. In the distance, a woman at the edge of a pond sings a river fullaby, and the howls of a strange beast drift through the trees. The widow of a Mardi Gras Indian chief sews a final costume for a ghost, and a graceful dancer discovers shards of valuable pottery buried in the soil. The forest seems to have grown into the shapes of doorways and thresholds, and each opening lets you into a new room, a new scene, a new

Dah Teatar Dancing With Darkness In 1999, when the U.S. began bombing Belgrade, Dah Teatar was in New Zealand performing *The Helen Keller Case*. The company was forced to split up and that piece was lost to history. Now Dah actress Sanja Krsmanovic-Tasic tells the story of the creation and destruction of The Helen Keller Case and of

As the investigation progresses, the case begins to unravel, as does the very fabric of Holmes's logical reality.

Mondo Bizarro Catching Him In Pieces
Poet, teacher, renowned emcee and bar fly, in his time Everette Maddox was considered by some to be "the best loved poet in the city of New Orleans." Pieces is comprised of Everette's poems and personal letters, along with adaptations from literature and original writings by the actors.

A wild all-night argument that captures the anarchic spirit of the classic Punch and Judy puppet show. Slaptsick, stylish, viciously honest, and full of surprises, the show is performed by two virtuoso performers who leap between realism and surrealism, exposing the horror and beauty of a relationship. Taking Chekhov's classic *Three Sisters* as its point of departure — the train that will eventually take the sisters to their dream place (Moscow), the repeated missed opportunities and lost chances — Dah Teatar's newest piece explores issues of missing people, missing languages and missing truths, and the meaning of memory in relation to truth — especially harsh truth.

Jill Greenhalgh Water[war]s
Jill is a lecturer in Performance Studies at the University of Wales Aberystwyth and the founder of The
Magdalena Project, International Network of Women in Contemporary Theatre. Over the last six years,
across a progression of commissioned residencies from countries including Australia, Colombia, Serbia
and others, Greenhalgh and Mike Brookes have created a global series of site-specific public performances motivated by the fact of our planet's looming water shortage. New Orleanians and festival attendees are invited to take part in what will be the tenth and final manifestation of the <code>Water[war]s</code>.

Odin Teatret Traces in the Snow | Dialogue Between Two Actors | Salt

In Traces in the Snow, the actor's technique itself becomes the protagonist of the story. The actress carries on a dialogue with the secrets which precede and follow the building of a character and the creation of a performance - and in the process, she exposes these secrets. Two of Odin Teatret's senior actors confront Ibsen's classic text A Doll's House in A Dialogue Between Two Actors. On stage, they explore different ways of creating a sequence of actions and setting that sequence in relation to the text. Alternating the creative work with explanations, they present the personal process and indicate the motivations behind their choices. Salt, performed by Roberta Carreri and musician Jan Ferslev and based on a short story by Antonio Tabucchi, is the story of a woman's odyssey. "It is a trip through a blind labyrinth, behind the thread of the days of her life, searching for the sound that has been the cause of her suffering -- the dull bellowing of the Minotaur" (Tabucchi).
